









ARE YOU INTERESTED IN A MUSEUM INTERNSHIP?

APPLY FOR THE WASHINGTON D.C. INTERNSHIP PROGRAM!

PROGRAM OVERVIEW:

<u>The Washington D.C. Internship Program</u> (DCIP) is a five-week, full-time museum studies internship opportunity for up to four (4) <u>East Los Angeles College</u> (ELAC) students to work with the <u>Smithsonian Institution</u> or the <u>National Gallery of Art</u> in Washington, D.C.

In 2018, ELAC, the <u>Vincent Price Art Museum</u>, the Smithsonian's <u>National Museum of the American Latino</u> (NMAL), and the National Gallery, developed a national partnership to champion accessibility and diversity within the museum field by providing ELAC students an entrypoint into museum work through a well-rounded, robust professional and personal development experience. The NMAL offers this program as part of its <u>Latino Museum Studies Program</u> (LMSP) Undergraduate Internship. The LMSP Undergraduate Internship is a career pathway program designed to increase hands-on training opportunities for Latina/o/x-identifying undergraduate students interested in art museum careers.

This program includes a week-long (January 2 – 5, 2024) orientation in Los Angeles, California with leading museum professional guest speaker presentations, career-oriented workshops, and reflection discussions. Thereafter, interns will travel to Washington, D.C. to participate in a month-long (January 8 – February 2, 2024), mentor-led internship at one of the nation's premier museums. Concurrently, ELAC student interns will participate in an online ELAC course Art 385: Directed Study during the internship period.

ELIGIBILITY:

- 1. Applicant must be 18 years or older.
- 2. Applicant must be an enrolled ELAC Student (Spring and/or Summer 2023 semester).
- 3. Applicant must be authorized to work in the United States. This includes US Citizens, Green Card holders, DACA recipients, and international students.
- 4. Applicant must be available to travel domestically.
- 5. Applicant must be able to enroll in the online ELAC course *Art 385: Directed Study* (3 units) during the Winter 2024.
- 6. Applicant must be available for full-time internship from: January 2, 2024 February 2, 2024 in Washington, D.C.
- 7. Previous DCIP participants are ineligible to apply.











ACCOMMODATIONS:

Program accommodations will be provided at no-cost to the student intern, which include: airfare, lodging, and a stipend.

HOW TO APPLY:

Interested and eligible ELAC students are encouraged to apply! Submit an online application through the Smithsonian Online Academic Appointments (SOLAA) portal at solaa.si.edu/solaa by the application deadline: Monday, July 17, 2023 at 5:00pm PT. Create an account in SOLAA and search for "ELAC Vincent Price Art Museum Internship" in the search bar in order to access and complete the application. Application requirements include: a resume, personal statement, and unofficial transcripts. Printed or mailed applications will not be accepted. View a video tutorial here.

☐ Personal Statement: Please respond to ALL four (4) questions below (Total word count
750 - 1,000):

- 1. What interests you about museums today? What do you most enjoy about museums and why?
- 2. How do your identities, lived experiences, and/or perspectives shape your academic, professional, and/or community work? How would you contribute to the internship program, peers, and partnering institutions (i.e. ELAC, VPAM, Smithsonian Institution, National Gallery)?
- 3. How will this internship contribute to your educational goals and desired career?
- 4. How would you change the museum field for future generations and how would this impact Latinx and/or Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities?
